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#### **About Our Conference Logo and Theme**

At an early Conference Host Committee (CHC) meeting we asked participants to provide us words and phrases that they felt symbolized the positive aspects of Oakland. At our next CHC meeting we then asked participants to select five of the suggested themes in a dot exercise at the next CHC meeting. The top selected themes were Authenticity, Branches/Tree, and Diversity/Equity.

After some reworking, we developed the theme "Rooted in AuthentiCITY". It combines natural imagery with urban contexts. Also as roots can refer to one's involvement in a community and place, it also highlighted the personal connections that are integral to planning.



Once our theme was selected, the CHC held an open logo competition. In the end, 15 members of the CHC reviewed and discussed the 10 entries that were received. The group evaluated each logo based on its overall design, ability to be reproduced at different sizes, and correlation to the conference theme

Amie Krager, a Graphic Designer from CirclePoint, designed the winning entry. The logo shows the Oakland skyline while emphasizing the city's solid roots. The colors communicate a sense of pride, and rays symbolize the community's potential and growth. It has become an essential symbol of our conference, ties to the local community, and represents what we hope you learn from the conference and the host city.

aspects of the city. We then asked CHC members to select the three items that they most liked in a dot exercise. The two most popular items were combined into our conference theme – "Rooted in AuthentiCITY." We then held a logo competition to select our winning logo design.

It is with this open spirit we welcome you to Oakland. On Saturday, the conference will begin with student sessions and professional development presentations in the morning followed by the first professional sessions in the afternoon. After the sessions the always engaging Diversity Summit panel will discuss the economic and social capital displacements that arise during gentrification.

Saturday evening will end with an exciting outdoor reception at the Oakland Museum of California. Spend time in the open courtyard enjoying local food and drinks, listening to great music, voting on student posters, exploring the terraces that overlook Oakland's crown jewel – Lake Merritt, and visiting the California Hall of History. Oh, did we mention, this will be an opportunity to meet with 1,500 of your fellow planning colleagues?

Sunday marks the first full day of professional sessions at the conference. Our opening keynote will be about the development of a downtown plan for Oakland by the Regional Planning Director of SPUR, a local Bay Area policy think tank. The evening's highlight will be the annual CPF auction which helps raise money to provide scholarships to deserving planning students.

As Northern Section is the home of Silicon Valley our Monday lunch keynote will be a moderated discussion between executives of several technology companies regarding the impacts of their operations and workforces on local communities. The evening Consultant Reception recognizes the sponsors that are helping make this conference a reality. We will conclude the conference with a half day of sessions before our closing keynote.

Although we will have lots to keep you involved with conference activities, we encourage you to explore Oakland and the Bay Area. Our host hotel is on top of a Bay Area Regional Transit (BART) station that provides fast, convenient access to other parts of Oakland, Berkeley, San Francisco, and other communities. The Bay Area and the Northern Section, which extends from the Oregon border to the southern edge of Monterey County, offers much to visit. - Minimize use of your smartphone on the street as it draws attention – this is especially true at night.
- Remove your conference badge when walking outside of the Convention Center.
- Avoid darkly lit areas at night and minimize what you carry.
- Check your surroundings before getting in and out of your car.



# WELCOMING REMARKS - Lynette Gibson McElhaney, Oakland City Council President OPENING KEYNOTE - Egon Terplan, Regional Planning Director, SPUR



The Opening Keynote will feature Egon Terplan, the Regional Planning Director for SPUR, a San Francisco Bay Area urban policy think tank and civic group whose mission is to promote good planning and good government in the Bay Area. Mr. Terplan, who has over 14 years of regional planning and research expertise, will highlight the key findings from SPUR's first comprehensive planning report on downtown Oakland, which will be released in September 2015 just in time for the conference.

SPUR recently expanded its involvement in Oakland planning with the opening of an office in the heart of downtown Oakland. The City's increasing importance to the economy and identity of the Bay Area

was the driving force for establishing an Oakland base. SPUR recognizes the incredible assets the City can build upon: eight BART stations, direct rail service to Sacramento and San Jose, and AC bus transit; a walkable urban street grid; more affordable housing than San Francisco and San Jose; a fantastic network of parks; an engaged, sophisticated citizenry; a nationally significant art, restaurant and nightlife scene; a robust manufacturing ecosystem; developable land within walking distance of transit; and anchor institutions like the Port of Oakland (the fifth largest in the nation), among many other assets.

At the same time, SPUR realizes that Oakland faces challenges. It is perched in a paradoxical and highly charged position, dealing with problems of serious poverty — not enough economic opportunity for its residents, not enough money to cover basic public services — while simultaneously facing fears of rising rents and displacement as job growth in the broader region creates spillover demand for housing. SPUR sees an urgent need for the City to strengthen its capacity to provide public services, to come up with strategies for long-term affordability, and to figure out new approaches to public safety. Finding a way to support Oakland would be an enormous win for the social equity movement as well as for smart growth.

Egon will discuss how SPUR will contribute to the passionate dialogue surrounding the future of Oakland. The organization will provide research and technical assistance with the goal of stimulating an active exchange of ideas. SPUR hopes to bring a regional perspective to Oakland issues and elevate the role of Oakland in regional decision-making. Hear how SPUR hopes to assist Bay Area cities that are searching to invent a new form of urbanism that will provide a sustainable and high-quality life for all residents.

Many communities are challenged to meet varying priorities that can at times seem unrelated to natural hazard mitigation or climate adaptation. #### American River Parkway, County of Sacramento

The American River Parkway is the "Crown Jewel of Sacramento". The Parkway is a blueprint for preservation of a naturalized environment while providing recreational activities for more than 5 million visitors each year. The 23-mile, 4900 acre Parkway extends from Folsom Dam at the northeast to the American River's confluence with the Sacramento River at the southwest with easy access to recreational opportunities for over a million Sacramento residents. The Lower American River is the central focus of the



American River Parkway and is classified as a "Recreation" river within the State and Federal Wild and Scenic River System. This unique wildlife and recreation area lures joggers, cyclists, strollers, naturalists, horseback riders, birdwatchers, picnickers, and fishermen. It is the place to be in the Sacramento area for a serene getaway in the middle of urbanization and for healthy active recreation.

#### Balboa Park, City of San Diego

Celebrating its 100th birthday this year, Balboa Park exemplifies the criteria of what a Great Place in California is. Originally envisioned in 1868, San Diego civic leaders set aside 1,400 acres, which was referred to simply as "City Park." Presently encompassing 1,200 acres, the entire region benefits from this regional focal point. The central portion of the park was constructed for the 1915 Panama-California Exposition, which is why 2015 marks the park's centennial celebration. Balboa Park is a great place of



contrasts: the core of the park is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and contains historic buildings from the first exposition, complemented by modern museum additions; while it is one of San Diego's top tourist attractions, it is utilized as a neighborhood park by surrounding residents; it is a place to come to rest and relax and provides numerous passive recreation opportunities, or you can visit the San Diego Zoo, museums, ride a carousel, or miniature train. While it is a spectacular destination in the summer, crowds also flock to the park for December Nights, when the park is illuminated with lights and activities to mark the holiday season.

#### Old Town Monrovia, City of Monrovia

Old Town Monrovia is a 10 square block area spanning from Olive Avenue on the south to Foothill Boulevard (formerly Route 66) on the north and Ivy Avenue on the east to Primrose Avenue on the west. Yet, within that small area resides the heart of the City of Monrovia. From historic preservation to environmental stewardship to public art to special events, Old Town Monrovia represents the values of the community in many important ways.

Old Town Monrovia has achieved its status as a retail, dining, and entertainment destination for the San Gabriel Valley and beyond by providing a safe environment that is welcoming for all; it is truly a 100-year overnight success. Monrovia is the fourth oldest city in Los Angeles County, and the downtown



area attracted businesses from surrounding communities. Downtown Monrovia was a thriving central business district from the City's incorporation in 1887, but by the early 1970's, downtown was a vacant shell of its former self. The City of Monrovia embarked on a complete renovation of the streetscape along Myrtle Avenue, creating Old Town Monrovia with the focus to enhance and celebrate the history of Myrtle Avenue as the historic and emotional center of Monrovia.
